n the national, continental and international levels, 2002 has been a fruitful year for CFM assemblies realized and being planned in all six ICCFM continents. The meetings achieve closer communication and interaction recommended in Resolution 4 of the 2001 ICCFM World Assembly of Families in Brazil: "That the International Confederation of Christian Family Movements promote unity in the CFM and help restore and activate its internal and external solidarity."

Aside from the spiritual enrichment and new action plans gained during the conference process, the meetings heighten unity and foster solidarity among CFM members through loving personal contact and mutual encouragement. In turn, this togetherness generates a transcendent power for greater fervor in the service, as promised by Jesus Himself when aroups gather together in His name.

The international assemblies now being focused on and

undergoing preparations through the concerted efforts of the ICCFM are the World Assembly of Families and ICCFM General Assembly in 2004, and in 2003 the Latin American Encounter and Latin American General Assembly, the CFM European Congress and the CFM Asia Continental Convention.

World Assembly of Families and ICCFM General Assembly, San Jose, California, USA

The World Assembly with the proposed theme, "Family: Artisans of an Evolving Society," will be held in July 2004, with the priority dates tentatively set as follows:

Priority 1, July 21-25; Priority 2, July 14-18; and Priority 3, July 28-August 1.

The World Assembly of Families will be conducted Tuesday to Friday while the ICCFM General Assembly will be from Saturday to Sunday noon. The Assembly program will begin at 8:30 a.m. and end by 9 p.m.

The conference will use the Cardijn methodology of OBSERVE-JUDGE-ACT to discern the role of married couples as authentic partners and co-creators with God in a constantly evolving society. It will focus on the true meaning of the marriage relationship and its responsibility for addressing the challenges of a contemporary society being transformed in a postmodern age. Specifically, the assembly will reaffirm the value of marriage and the family in the critical examination and redirection of society's shift in a technological era.

At most 200 persons are expected participate fully in the convention process. There may be larger numbers for the Opening Ceremony and on the weekend due to local members participating. To accommodate special participants, a day rate for the assembly will be established.

Assembly participants will reside in a hotel or be on homestay with local MFC and CFM families. In the marketing plan for the Assembly, continental couples and country presidents are exhorted to set attendance goals of one couple and one clergy from each country. All delegates are urged to utilize the World Assembly website for information, registration, forms and procedures.

These proposals and decisions were taken up during two planning meetings last July 6-7, 2001, at the CFM USA National Convention in Miami, Florida, and on July 20-21 at the MFC USA National Convention in San Jose. California.

arm welcome from CFM families of Orlem, Mumbai. We were delighted when ICCFM president Elma Muangkroot, who was to attend a Teachers' Conference in our city, expressed a wish to meet the CFMers. We pointed out to Elma the Family Reading Rack set up by the CFM in the Church compound which has a plentiful supply of religious books and magazines for children and adults who desire to read. Parishioners themselves keep the shelves supplied with reading matter.

Our chaplain, Fr.Vincent D'Souza, was happy to meet Elma and invited us to the refectory for a cup of tea. While we were chatting, Fr.Alex Carvallho, one of the assistants, joined us. In her inimitable and charming manner, Elma talked to the two priests about the CFM and its mission to strengthen and support good family life. She did her best to get Fr.Alex involved, and Fr.Vincent more involved with the Movement, asking them to encourage couples to join.

After a short stop at our home, we went across to "Xavirene", the residence of CFMers, Xav and Irene Sequeira, where the Orlem CFMers had gathered to meet and dine with Elma. Everyone felt at home with our honoured guest, as she spoke warmly with each CFMer and took dozens of pictures. Her warmth and goodwill make her an excellent ambassador for the CFM.

The next day, after a hurried shopping spree, Elma and her friends returned to Bangkok. It was a short, but happy interlude for CFM, Orlem. Bangalore reunion

With Dennis Chua, CFM Asia President, Nop and Elma visited Bangalore last April 6 - 9, with the main purpose of asking India to host the next CFM Asia Continental Convention in 2003. Despite the unholy hour of their midnight arrival, Nop and Elma were met at the airport by longtime CFM leaders and international representatives David and Aloma Lobo, who took them to their sprawling, ivy-covered home set in a lush garden with ancient trees, colorful flowers in bloom and a fishpond created from a small waterfall.

On Sunday morning Bangalore CFM'ers gathered for a Holy Mass concelebrated by CFM chaplains, among them founding Chaplain Rev. Fr. Oswald Dijkstra and present National Chaplain Rev. Fr. Joseph Fonseca. It was a beautiful Mass with both lively and solemn music provided by CFM couples and children, ending with special blessings for CFM members, both guests and hosts. An assembly followed at which Nop and Elma reported on recent ICCFM activities and answered questions about CFM Thailand. They also imparted the purpose of their visit, to ask Bangalore to host the next Asian Convention. Dennis reiterated the request and entertained the assembly with his amusing yet thought-provoking sharing of his vision for CFM Asia. In return, both Chaplains as well as CFM India Presidents Francis and Carmel Colaso and CFM Bangalore Presidents Albert and Rosalind Selvanayagam addressed the meeting, assuring the guests that CFM India accepts in principle to host the 2003 Asia Convention, pending confirmation after a CFM India national meeting.

A meeting to discuss details about the proposed Convention was held at David and Aloma's residence on Monday morning, followed by an afternoon to the Silicon Valley of Bangalore, considered the technological center of Asia. In Hand in Hand by Gabriel Calvo: Questions and Answers for Young People

Provide Found Father Calvo's book: Hand in Hand very good for young couples as well as for marriage preparation. Therefore Krisztina translated it into Hungarian and we succeeded in publishing it in 3000 copies.

We beleive that this book can be used both as a marriage preparation guidebook for young couples as well as an efficient means for reaching out or for missions.

According to the publishers this book has been written for young couples, for every young person who longs for deeper communication; for everybody who wants to really get to know and fully accept themselves as well as their partner. For those who wonder: - What is the partner really suitable for me like? Have I really found the real One? - Is it true love that I feel or is it a temporary feeling of infatuation? - What do I have to pay attention to during the engagement period; what is really important? - Am I mature for marriage? - Can we be happy as a couple in 10, 20, 30 years time? How? What or who is the guarantee that we will be able to love each other in times of difficulty? This book is not a theoretical work but rather a workbook, a guideline which

offers the reader lots of wise thoughts, questions, ideas to think about, practical advice and topics to talk about. A sincere sharing on these is an extremely valuable and serious preparation for a healthy, good marriage and a happy, spiraling out family life.

Bishop Biro says:

I warmly recommend Hand in Hand to Hungarian readers. On the one hand because the author, Father Calvo - whom I have had the chance to meet several times - is a clear, true person; on the other hand, because he is a priest who has been working and praying for marriage and family for half a century, travelling without rest all around the world, and speaking to lots and lots of people and listening perhaps to even more. He is familiar not only with the marriage of Spain or America but also with the marriage of different continents including the marriage of Central Eastern Europe. He uses not the language of a scholar but speaks in a direct way, like an elderly brother to his younger brother. He does not only teach but also he asks questions, makes the readers think and gets them to act.

We have now one more good Catholic book, a book worthy of the weight of marriage. Marriage can only be spoken about seriously. This book tells deep truths in a form that is easily understood by everybody. It helps young readers to prepare in a worthy way for marriage, but it can be used with advantage by married couples, too. It also presents valuable help for priests in the pastoral care primarily for engaged couples but also for married couples.

The author is a Spanish Catholic priest, founder of Marriage Encounter and author of the Fires (in Hungarian: Mecs) programs. Through his service of almost half a century the lives of millions of engaged and married couples and young people have been made more beautiful, more joyful, and closer to God. His book is the summary of this extremely rich experience in family pastoral work; that is, it is a real treasure not only for engaged couples but also for young married couples and for priests and lay Christians who work for engaged couples.

Boomerang throwers wanted or how to expand CFM

ver the years, we tried every possible way to expand CFM. We even wrote a booklet for the National Board called "Share the Good News..." which was used the national as expansion plan for many years. All of this was met with mixed results. Finally after many years of

service to CFM we retired to devote ourselves to ministry to families on the parish level.

Shortly after that we were invited by Bishop Agustin A. Roman of Miami to develop a program to bring young married couples back to the church after the wedding. After a number of false starts, we developed the Covenant Experience, as a parish based, low-cost, marriage enrichment program. While we initially targeted the program for newly married couples we found that couples of all ages profited equally from the program. We found that couples improved their marriages and their commitment to the Lord who is the third person in each marriage. Couples began to be "turned on" to parish activities and to each other. What we did not expect was that at the end of the four follow-up meetings couples wanted to continue in the small group meetings. Of course the answer was the Christian Family Movement.

We have found that one of more new CFM groups were formed at the end of each COVENANT EXPERIENCE weekend. Moreover,



groups continued in CFM and social action longer than couples recruited by other means.

We found that by concentrating on ministry to married couples rather than expansion of CFM we actually performed a valid ministry to many couples and in the process also started more CFM groups than before. We found that by throwing away organizational goals and concentrating on ministry the results

came back in the form of requests for something more. That is why we are looking for boomerang throwers.

People are not turned-on by a request to join an organization. They are interested in improving their marriage and if that process produces results then they want to continue with it. People are too busy today to join just another organization. They want to satisfy more basic needs of intimacy, companionship and finding friends in the Lord and in the community.

Soon our friends were asking how the COVENANT EXPERIENCE could be used in the Spanish speaking part of our community. The participant materials were translated into Spanish and the program has been highly successful in our multicultural city.

the evening, Francis and Carmel hosted a dinner at their spacious, attractive home, at which Nop, Elma and Dennis had another chance to meet the CFM officers who will form the Asian Convention organizing committee. Tuesday morning before departure, Francis showed Nop, Elma and Dennis the proposed Convention venue, which immediately met with everyone's approval. The final date selected for the Convention is October 24 - 26, 2003.

Panama sojourn

Nop and Elma visited Panama on July 25 to 29, in the hope fostering a closer communication with MFC Latin America, which has the largest and the most vigorous ICCFM membership in terms of number, programs and services. They wanted to have firsthand information about the MFC and to learn what makes it succeed so the strategies could be shared with the rest of the world. The visit was also an opportunity to meet the new Latin American Continental Presidents William and Esilda Cheng, who were elected only last November 2001, and to campaign for Latin American participation in the 2004 ICCFM World Assembly of Families in San Jose, California, USA.

Here are the highlights of the visit as lifted from the diary of Nop and Elma:

- July 25 We were met by Presidents William and Esilda and taken to their beautiful new home for a rest. In the evening we attended Mass at their parish, which turned out to be a special Mass for children. Once a month there is a weekday Mass especially for children, carrying out Jesus' words, "Let the little ones come to me." Atter Mass, the priest called the children, told them how special they are to Jesus, gave them holy pictures. Later the parish ladies gave chocolates to the children.
- July 26 By chance we were able to attend Mass in one of the Panama City Churches, and there was a special Mass for grandparents. It was quite a pleasant surprise as just the day before we had attended a special Mass for chidren! At the end of the Mass the priest honored the grandparents, calling them to the front and giving out special awards. Nop got a special award, too!

In the afternoon we made a courtesy call on Panama Archbishop Mons. Jose Dimas Cedeno. He was very gracious and welcoming, spoke proudly of the MFC, a very active group in family evangelization, family services, as well as services to the poor. He expressed his total support for the MFC and his admiration for the Movement.

Summertime, America: a season for CFM reunions

Summer 2002 was a propitious period for CFM in both North America and Latin America as it saw the convention of three eagerly anticipated national gatherings.

ARGENTINA

A grand assembly of MFC families was held in Cosquin on the weekend of June 29, consisting of a full agenda of important MFC Argentina matters:

National MFC Elections, Reunion of MFC Diocesan Presidents, National Encounter of Past Directors and National Forum on Responsible Parenthood.

The theme of the National Encounter was "Towards a Spirituality of the Family for the Twenty-first Century." Developed by National Chaplain Rev. Fr. Juan Carlos Meinvielle, it is based on the famous text from the Confessions of St. Augustine, "Late I loved you." Three basic aspects of spirituality were examined:

- 1. The SOURCES are the sacramental life, the Word of God, the inner life, solidarity, the daily search for God and the vital connection with God not based on form or order but on the sacrament of the Word.
- 2. The WAY is to row out to sea, to evangelize the culture of society, discerning it and reaching to it through the exercise of virtue. Factors to be considered are God's time, history, the world and the town. To give testimony means not only to catechize but also to evangelize.
- 3. The VOCATION for those called to sanctity is to live in hope.

Representatives from all the eight zones of MFC Argentina elected the new National Directors to lead the MFC in the new millennium, whose primary goal is to promote the MFC in all the dioceses. Past Presidents Arnold and Esther Witzel were elected Vice-Presidents, and the new Presidents are Jorge and Lucy Calvo, who have dedicated 35 years to the MFC. Jorge and Lucy write, "We assume with responsibility the delicate mission that God assigns to us at this moment of our lives. We renew our commitment to the MFC based on three aspects we request you to consider: to be witnesses of hope, healers of wounds, and pillars of unity. Our aspiration is that end of the triennium, our chosen motto will be realized, "The MFC missionary: good news for the third millennium."

The Forum on Responsible Parenthood on the theme "New Life" was developed by Messuti and Maurizi Delfino with the collaboration of Dr. Marina Curria. Fifty participants from all the zones were involved in this forum.

UNITED STATES CFM USA National Convention

The CFM USA National Convention held on July 4-7 in Miami, Florida was enlightening, inspiring, and very successful, and the participants left with a strong conviction of the power of the family to change the world.

The theme was "God is in Our House," a weekend celebrating family spirituality. Convention chairpersons were CFM USA Vice-Presidents Bob and Anne Tomonto.

Keynote speaker David Thomas in his talk on "The Road Never Traveled" pointed out that the challenge of an incarnational Christianity is to connect God's loving Spirit with the unique and very concrete realities of each era.

Joe Holland, another keynote speaker, took up "The Social Spirituality of the Family." He said that the 500-year era of the "modern world" is now ending, leaving disintegration. A new postmodern multicultural global period of social history is now beginning and a postmodern Catholic spirituality of family can become a strategic contribution to healing that disintegration, he hopefully concluded.

Special CFM presentations during the event were "The Covenant Experience" by Bob and Irene Tomonto; "Creating Dynamic Groups" by Gary and Kay Aitchison; "The Legacy of Cardijn" by Paul and Jane Leingang and "The ICCFM" by Nop and Elma Muangkroot,

The delegates also went through an Exposure Program, visiting disadvantaged communities and holding discussions on the social dimensions in the Mexican farmworkers',

Haitian and Cuban immigrants' communities.

Other features were teens' and children's program. A concert, a CFM picnic, a theme party and dance "Miami Style" perked up the evenings of the Convention while in a creative project, families "built a house" with their posters and commitments as a part of the Concluding Liturgy.

The CFM/USA has a membership of 1600 families. National Presidents are Peter and Jane Buchbauer; National Chaplain is Rev. DoConroy and Executive Directors are Paul and Jane Leingang.

MFC USA National Convention

The MFC USA National Convention was held last July 19-21 at San Jose, California. The event with the theme, "MFC/USA Families Constructing a Better Society," had inspiring lay speakers, practical and relevant workshops led by both experts and MFC couples and a big participation of 800 delegates, all providing strong evidence that MFC USA is a vibrant and dynamic Movement with committed leaders and members.

The convention was organized by the Past MFC National Secretariat composed of National Presidents Mario and Margarita Gavidia, Chaplain Rev. Clemente Barron, Vice-Presidents Baldomero and Mavi Torres, Secretaries Dario and Maria Saenz and Treasurers Hector and Mercedes Mira. The Convention also elected a National Board. The incoming National Presidents are Mario and Juanita Figueroa and National Chaplain is Rev. Rafael J. Davila.

Keynote speakers on the topic, "MFC/USA Families Constructing a Better Society" were Dr. Ricardo and Mrs. Beatriz Riojas. "The Holy Family, Model for MFC/USA" was taken up by Dr. Gabriel and Mrs. Marina Martinez.

Religious dignitaries present were Monsignor Patricio Flores, Archbishop of San Antonio; Monsignor Patrick McGrath, Bishop of San Jose and Monsignor Richard Garcia, Auxillary Bishop of Sacramento. Special guests were ICCFM Presidents Nop and Elma Muangkroot, North American Presidents Gary and Kay Aitchison, CFM USA guests Wayne and Sue Hamilton, Carolyn Broeren, Rev. Fr. Ken Weare.

MFC USA, which has a membership of 2,000 families, is made up of federations in seven regions of the United States. It is a Spanish-speaking Movement.

ASIA

India

At the end, the parents felt a great sense of contentment that their children had benefited from being a part of a big CFM family.

Agnel and Anette D'Cruz of Mumbai have recommended that the ICCFM admit as supporting member the Science and Research Foundation of Asia on Family and Culture (SERFAC), a pro-life and profamily NGO which shares a similar mission in family service. Led by Sr. Catherine Bernard, its mission is to create an awareness about the evolving social and technological systems that contradict the basic values of marriage and family life and to actively engage in the creative tasks of forming/fostering relationships and values that promote stable marriages and healthy family life. A consultation with Joe and Margarita Pich led to the conclusion that the two organizations indeed share a similar ideology and steps are being taken to effect the membership.

National Presidents Francis and Carmel Colaso of Bangalore will rally their members all over the country for help in preparing for the Asian Continental Convention in October 2003 at the CFM India National Board meeting to be held on November 3–4, in Mumbai. In Bangalore, of course, the process of organizing the conference is already going on.

"Thinking of the summer we have some wonderful experiences to remember. For the first time in Hungary, we had the Family Communication Workshop, the Engaged Encounter and the Self Encounter introduced by Fr Donnon Murray. All the three were blessed experiences . . . We think, however, that we can never know the real results of any FIRES experience. The only results are those deep changes in the hearts of participants which cannot be measured or achieved, only hoped for and accepted as grace from the Lord . . .

It definitely seems that there is great interest in the Engaged Encounter. Couples recommend it to friends. Therefore we plan to have one again next spring. On November 30 we are going to give a Family Communication Workshop to a CFM group and other families. There has also been inquiries about the next Self Encounter, which we might have again in the autumn of 2003, but that is still uncertain. In the near future we are planning a Sons And Daughters Encounter (November 17 - 20) and a Marriage Encounter (November 8 - 10). . .

Last Sunday we had our CFM Veni Sancte Mass. We opened the new schoolyear with the group leader couples of 23 CFM groups. There are some more groups to start now, not only in Budapest but also in the country. It is wonderful to see how people who experience FIRES Marriage Encounter become enthused to belong or even to start CFM groups. And vice versa, all CFM couples who have not made ME yet are invited to make it. It would be a wonderful experience for a whole group to make ME together.

We are working hard on the outlines of CFM group meetings. As a result, five years' outlines will be printed in a booklet form within two months. . . Fr Gabriel Calvo's Hand in Hand is selling well: out of 3000 copies, 1000 are being sold in bookshops all over Hungary (and beyond, in Transsylvania, too). Out of the 2000 that we have stored in our home there are fewer than 600 left! We receive lots of enthused opinions about it. Next year we are planning to translate and publish Fr. Calvo's other books: Face to Face, then Family Energy." More power and congratulations to CFM Hungary!

Italy

ICCFM Chaplain Msgr. Charles Vella assures us that he is offering Holy Mass every first Sunday of the month for CFM families as a spiritual link of brotherhood and love among all families, especially those who are in difficulty.

NEWS FROM SPAIN

In July the National Youth Gathering organized by the Service for the Youth will be held in Alicante and will gather 200 young people and adolescents.

The Official Opening Ceremony on the afternoon of July 17 will feature addresses by Marijo and Darka, the Apostolic Nuncio, Tony and Lily with Fr. N. Debono Montebello, representing the CFM Europe Presidency, and Nop and Elma Muangkroot, ICCFM President Couple. There will also be addresses by the civil and ecclesiastical authorities. After the Congress there will be an optional tour of two days to Medjugorje.

CFM Asia Continental Convention, Bangalore, India.

The CFM Asia Convention has been scheduled for September 19 to 21, 2003. The theme, still to be confirmed, will relate to the different aspects of CFM service in Asia and the methodology of See-Judge-Act. About 30 to 40 foreign delegates are expected to participate in the program in addition to the national delegates.
